Future developments. For the latest information about developments related to Form W-9 and its instructions, such as legislation enacted after they were published, go to www.irs.gov/FormW9.

#### **Purpose of Form**

An individual or entity (Form W-9 requester) who is required to file an information return with the IRS must obtain your correct taxpayer identification number (TIN) which may be your social security number (SSN), individual taxpayer identification number (ITIN), adoption taxpayer identification number (ATIN), or employer identification number (EIN), to report on an information return the amount paid to you, or other amount reportable on an information return. Examples of information returns include, but are not limited to, the following.

• Form 1099-INT (interest earned or paid)

- Form 1099-DIV (dividends, including those from stocks or mutual funds)
- Form 1099-MISC (various types of income, prizes, awards, or gross proceeds)
- Form 1099-B (stock or mutual fund sales and certain other transactions by brokers)
- Form 1099-S (proceeds from real estate transactions)
- Form 1099-K (merchant card and third party network transactions)
- Form 1098 (home mortgage interest), 1098-E (student loan interest), 1098-T (tuition)
- Form 1099-C (canceled debt)
- Form 1099-A (acquisition or abandonment of secured property)

Use Form W-9 only if you are a U.S. person (including a resident alien), to provide your correct TIN.

If you do not return Form W-9 to the requester with a TIN, you might be subject to backup withholding. See What is backup withholding,

By signing the filled-out form, you:

- 1. Certify that the TIN you are giving is correct (or you are waiting for a number to be issued),
  - 2. Certify that you are not subject to backup withholding, or
- 3. Claim exemption from backup withholding if you are a U.S. exempt payee. If applicable, you are also certifying that as a U.S. person, your allocable share of any partnership income from a U.S. trade or business is not subject to the withholding tax on foreign partners' share of effectively connected income, and
- 4. Certify that FATCA code(s) entered on this form (if any) indicating that you are exempt from the FATCA reporting, is correct. See *What is FATCA reporting*, later, for further information.

**Note:** If you are a U.S. person and a requester gives you a form other than Form W-9 to request your TIN, you must use the requester's form if it is substantially similar to this Form W-9.

**Definition of a U.S. person.** For federal tax purposes, you are considered a U.S. person if you are:

- An individual who is a U.S. citizen or U.S. resident alien;
- A partnership, corporation, company, or association created or organized in the United States or under the laws of the United States;
- · An estate (other than a foreign estate); or
- A domestic trust (as defined in Regulations section 301.7701-7).

Special rules for partnerships. Partnerships that conduct a trade or business in the United States are generally required to pay a withholding tax under section 1446 on any foreign partners' share of effectively connected taxable income from such business. Further, in certain cases where a Form W-9 has not been received, the rules under section 1446 require a partnership to presume that a partner is a foreign person, and pay the section 1446 withholding tax. Therefore, if you are a U.S. person that is a partner in a partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States, provide Form W-9 to the partnership to establish your U.S. status and avoid section 1446 withholding on your share of partnership income.

In the cases below, the following person must give Form W-9 to the partnership for purposes of establishing its U.S. status and avoiding withholding on its allocable share of net income from the partnership conducting a trade or business in the United States.

- In the case of a disregarded entity with a U.S. owner, the U.S. owner of the disregarded entity and not the entity;
- In the case of a grantor trust with a U.S. grantor or other U.S. owner, generally, the U.S. grantor or other U.S. owner of the grantor trust and not the trust; and
- In the case of a U.S. trust (other than a grantor trust), the U.S. trust (other than a grantor trust) and not the beneficiaries of the trust.

**Foreign person.** If you are a foreign person or the U.S. branch of a foreign bank that has elected to be treated as a U.S. person, do not use Form W-9. Instead, use the appropriate Form W-8 or Form 8233 (see Pub. 515, Withholding of Tax on Nonresident Aliens and Foreign Entities).

Nonresident alien who becomes a resident alien. Generally, only a nonresident alien individual may use the terms of a tax treaty to reduce or eliminate U.S. tax on certain types of income. However, most tax treaties contain a provision known as a "saving clause." Exceptions specified in the saving clause may permit an exemption from tax to continue for certain types of income even after the payee has otherwise become a U.S. resident alien for tax purposes.

If you are a U.S. resident alien who is relying on an exception contained in the saving clause of a tax treaty to claim an exemption from U.S. tax on certain types of income, you must attach a statement to Form W-9 that specifies the following five items.

- 1. The treaty country. Generally, this must be the same treaty under which you claimed exemption from tax as a nonresident alien.
  - 2. The treaty article addressing the income.
- 3. The article number (or location) in the tax treaty that contains the saving clause and its exceptions.
- 4. The type and amount of income that qualifies for the exemption from tax.
- 5. Sufficient facts to justify the exemption from tax under the terms of the treaty article.

**Example.** Article 20 of the U.S.-China income tax treaty allows an exemption from tax for scholarship income received by a Chinese student temporarily present in the United States. Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident alien for tax purposes if his or her stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student becomes a resident alien of the United States. A Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on his or her scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

If you are a nonresident alien or a foreign entity, give the requester the appropriate completed Form W-8 or Form 8233.

#### **Backup Withholding**

What is backup withholding? Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 24% of such payments. This is called "backup withholding." Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include interest, tax-exempt interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royalties, nonemployee pay, payments made in settlement of payment card and third party network transactions, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

You will not be subject to backup withholding on payments you receive if you give the requester your correct TIN, make the proper certifications, and report all your taxable interest and dividends on your tax return.

#### Payments you receive will be subject to backup withholding if:

- 1. You do not furnish your TIN to the requester,
- 2. You do not certify your TIN when required (see the instructions for Part II for details),
  - 3. The IRS tells the requester that you furnished an incorrect TIN,
- 4. The IRS tells you that you are subject to backup withholding because you did not report all your interest and dividends on your tax return (for reportable interest and dividends only), or
- 5. You do not certify to the requester that you are not subject to backup withholding under 4 above (for reportable interest and dividend accounts opened after 1983 only).

Certain payees and payments are exempt from backup withholding. See *Exempt payee code*, later, and the separate Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

Also see Special rules for partnerships, earlier.

#### What is FATCA Reporting?

The Foreign Account Tax Compliance Act (FATCA) requires a participating foreign financial institution to report all United States account holders that are specified United States persons. Certain payees are exempt from FATCA reporting. See *Exemption from FATCA reporting code*, later, and the Instructions for the Requester of Form W-9 for more information.

#### **Updating Your Information**

You must provide updated information to any person to whom you claimed to be an exempt payee if you are no longer an exempt payee and anticipate receiving reportable payments in the future from this person. For example, you may need to provide updated information if you are a C corporation that elects to be an S corporation, or if you no longer are tax exempt. In addition, you must furnish a new Form W-9 if the name or TIN changes for the account; for example, if the grantor of a grantor trust dies.

#### **Penalties**

Failure to furnish TIN. If you fail to furnish your correct TIN to a requester, you are subject to a penalty of \$50 for each such failure unless your failure is due to reasonable cause and not to willful neglect.

Civil penalty for false information with respect to withholding. If you make a false statement with no reasonable basis that results in no backup withholding, you are subject to a \$500 penalty.

**Criminal penalty for falsifying information.** Willfully falsifying certifications or affirmations may subject you to criminal penalties including fines and/or imprisonment.

**Misuse of TINs.** If the requester discloses or uses TINs in violation of federal law, the requester may be subject to civil and criminal penalties.

#### **Specific Instructions**

#### Line 1

You must enter one of the following on this line; **do not** leave this line blank. The name should match the name on your tax return.

If this Form W-9 is for a joint account (other than an account maintained by a foreign financial institution (FFI)), list first, and then circle, the name of the person or entity whose number you entered in Part I of Form W-9. If you are providing Form W-9 to an FFI to document a joint account, each holder of the account that is a U.S. person must provide a Form W-9.

a. **Individual.** Generally, enter the name shown on your tax return. If you have changed your last name without informing the Social Security Administration (SSA) of the name change, enter your first name, the last name as shown on your social security card, and your new last name.

**Note: ITIN applicant:** Enter your individual name as it was entered on your Form W-7 application, line 1a. This should also be the same as the name you entered on the Form 1040/1040A/1040EZ you filed with your application.

- b. **Sole proprietor or single-member LLC.** Enter your individual name as shown on your 1040/1040A/1040EZ on line 1. You may enter your business, trade, or "doing business as" (DBA) name on line 2.
- c. Partnership, LLC that is not a single-member LLC, C corporation, or S corporation. Enter the entity's name as shown on the entity's tax return on line 1 and any business, trade, or DBA name on line 2.
- d. **Other entities.** Enter your name as shown on required U.S. federal tax documents on line 1. This name should match the name shown on the charter or other legal document creating the entity. You may enter any business, trade, or DBA name on line 2.
- e. **Disregarded entity.** For U.S. federal tax purposes, an entity that is disregarded as an entity separate from its owner is treated as a "disregarded entity." See Regulations section 301.7701-2(c)(2)(iii). Enter the owner's name on line 1. The name of the entity entered on line 1 should never be a disregarded entity. The name on line 1 should be the name shown on the income tax return on which the income should be reported. For example, if a foreign LLC that is treated as a disregarded entity for U.S. federal tax purposes has a single owner that is a U.S. person, the U.S. owner's name is required to be provided on line 1. If the direct owner of the entity is also a disregarded entity, enter the first owner that is not disregarded for federal tax purposes. Enter the disregarded entity's name on line 2, "Business name/disregarded entity name." If the owner of the disregarded entity is a foreign person, the owner must complete an appropriate Form W-8 instead of a Form W-9. This is the case even if the foreign person has a U.S. TIN.

#### Line 4, Exemptions

For interest and dividend payments, and certain payments made with respect to readily tradable instruments, generally you will have 60 days to get a TIN and give it to the requester before you are subject to backup withholding on payments. #### **Secure Your Tax Records From Identity Theft**

Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personal information such as your name, SSN, or other identifying information, without your permission, to commit fraud or other crimes. An identity thief may use your SSN to get a job or may file a tax return using your SSN to receive a refund.

To reduce your risk:

- Protect your SSN.
- Ensure your employer is protecting your SSN, and
- Be careful when choosing a tax preparer.

If your tax records are affected by identity theft and you receive a notice from the IRS, respond right away to the name and phone number printed on the IRS notice or letter.

If your tax records are not currently affected by identity theft but you think you are at risk due to a lost or stolen purse or wallet, questionable credit card activity or credit report, contact the IRS Identity Theft Hotline at 1-800-908-4490 or submit Form 14039.

Protect yourself from suspicious emails or phishing schemes. Phishing is the creation and use of email and websites designed to mimic legitimate business emails and websites. The most common act is sending an email to a user falsely claiming to be an established legitimate enterprise in an attempt to scam the user into surrendering private information that will be used for identity theft.

The IRS does not initiate contacts with taxpayers via emails. Also, the IRS does not request personal detailed information through email or ask taxpayers for the PIN numbers, passwords, or similar secret access information for their credit card, bank, or other financial accounts.

If you receive an unsolicited email claiming to be from the IRS, forward this message to <code>phishing@irs.gov</code>. You may also report misuse of the IRS name, logo, or other IRS property to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) at 1-800-366-4484. You can forward suspicious emails to the Federal Trade Commission at <code>spam@uce.gov</code> or report them at <code>www.ftc.gov/complaint</code>. #### **Privacy Act Notice**



## WEST DAYTON INVESTMENTS

### RECENTLY COMPLETED, UNDER CONSTRUCTION, IN PROCESS AND UNDER DEVELOPMENT



At their peak, West Dayton neighborhoods were a gathering place and a nexus of flourishing African American small businesses and thriving manufacturing facilities that brought high-quality jobs to the community. West Dayton has experienced decades of redlining and economic disinvestment that led to population loss, high unemployment, and a lack of high-quality affordable housing choice for residents. These challenges continue to shape the trajectory of its neighborhoods today. In recent years, however, West Dayton has started to see renewed momentum and investment in its neighborhoods, starting with the award of a HUD Choice Neighborhood Grant, which brought crucial planning resources and initial funding for capital improvements to the area. Since then, the community has seen investment in placemaking, housing, new and existing businesses, recreation, new amenities, and the expansion of equitable access to broadband.

One important sign of this renewed momentum is the increase in permit activity; as of October 2020, permits pulled in 2020 were worth approximately \$65 million of work. By comparison, in 2019, permits were pulled for a total value of \$19 million of work. Many of the projects for which permits were pulled in 2020 were smaller investments—like the Sinclair Community College lab space remodel—but they demonstrate a broad interest in improving existing institutions and businesses to better meet the needs of the community in the future.

The projects that follow are some examples of this exciting new energy.



FIVE RIVERS HEALTH CENTER WEST DAYTON INVESTMENTS

Five Rivers Health Centers (FRHC) is committed to providing access to quality, comprehensive and respectful care for their patients and community. Currently FRHC serves more than 28,000 patients with more than 90,000 visits. Primary medical care shortages exist throughout the Dayton region. The entirety of the FRHC system serves as a vital safety-net for underserved populations, particularly those who are low-income.

Five Rivers Health Centers will consolidate programs and services from five sites into one larger, multipurpose, innovative, accessible building. The new campus will be located in the Edgemont Neighborhood and serve as a catalyst for additional development and investment. Through input from the community, staff, and patients, the Edgemont Campus will serve the needs of patients facing barriers such as transportation challenges and inadequate healthcare with accessible, high quality primary and specialty care.

The Edgemont Campus will eliminate logistical barriers and space restrictions by becoming a comprehensive health care facility—a "one-stop" shop for the individuals we serve. Along with our existing 15,000 patients at these five sites, the new space will enable FRHC to provide services to an additional 500 patients each year with improved parking and access to a wide-variety of services including acupuncture and massage therapies. Most importantly, the Edgemont Campus will be built for growth, with additional exam rooms and services that will meet the needs of the community.

In the late 1940s, the original vision for the area that includes Welcome Park fore-saw a regional recreation attraction. Today, the University of Dayton Arena, Dayton Public School's Welcome Stadium, and the City of Dayton's Welcome Park comprise the recreational nexus of the area. Completing the vision for the Dayton Bike Yard at Welcome Park will add a modern mountain bike amenity to this recreation space.

Starting in 2018, Welcome Park received a complete overhaul. Basketball courts and playground equipment were replaced and restored. The park shelter was painted, the bathrooms updated, and the multi-use path installed. These City investments ensure Welcome Park will remain a neighborhood amenity while supporting the park's transformation into a biking attraction that serves the region.

As a part of the 2016 HUD Choice Planning Grant awarded to Greater Dayton Premier Management and the City of Dayton, HUD provided \$1 million in Action Funding designed to support initial revitalization projects throughout the Choice area, including the Germantown St. Façade Improvement Program. This program was designed to provide financial assistance for business operators who were committed to making highly visible physical improvements of commercial retail facilities along Germantown St. Overall, \$80,000 was invested in the exterior improvements of five businesses at strategic locations along the corridor: an auto shop, three small food markets, and a long-standing BBQ restaurant. This program not only supported local businesses that have remained loyal to the area, but also was part of a broader strategy to enhance the overall visual appeal of the Germantown Corridor for residents and drivers passing through.

In order to "jump start" the rebuilding efforts in West Dayton, Greater Dayton Premier Management (GDPM), the local housing authority, and The Model Group have applied for funding through the Ohio Housing Finance Agency for Low Income Housing Tax Credits to build 50 affordable housing units in the Edgemont Neighborhood. Many residents in West Dayton have indicated a desire to remain in the area, but there is a deficit of high-quality affordable housing units available currently. The project proposes replacing antiquated units owned by GDPM with modern units that better meet the needs of familes.

















## PLACEMAKING WEST DAYTON INVESTMENTS



During HUD Choice community engagement sessions, a keytheme that emerged early in the planning process was the residents' desire to tell a different story about their community and take control over their own narrative. This launched a multi-phase project that includes a neighborhood branding and design effort; a partnership with WYSO to collect and share resident stories; and a series of murals and other placemaking efforts.

Four murals, multiple gateway signs, and a series of banners were implemented at key locations along Germantown St., an important corridor in the neighborhood. The design utilizes elements of the neighborhood branding campaign, which included feedback from stakeholders and residents, who expressed a desire for color, for positive messaging, and for celebrating the past while looking towards the future. The project changes the feel of specific spaces along the corridor, while also helping to tell a different story to individuals who only experience West Dayton as they drive through it on Germantown St. The branding and placemaking elements and murals were all designed by young artists with roots in West Dayton who were willing to engage with the community and interested in helping community members tell their own story.

Since creating a West Dayton brand, two neighborhoods in the community have worked with the same artists to develop their own brand, which complements the West Dayton brand. It is being implemented incrementally as funding becomes available.

Economy Towel & Linen Service Inc., a family-owned business in the Dayton region for over 80 years, is constructing a new 80,000-square-foot facility in West Dayton. This \$20 million investment will add at least 70 new jobs and generate over \$2.3 million in new payroll. According to owner, Bruce Feldman, the new facility provides linen rental and laundry services to healthcare and hospital facilities and will complement their other locations.

Founded in Dayton in 1931, Economy Linen is a family-owned and professionally managed firm providing medical and hospitality linen rentals and laundry programs. It was established by Harry Feldman and has been led by third generation co-owner Bruce Feldman since 1988. In addition to the Dayton plant, the company has opera-

tions in Cincinnati, Columbus, Zanesville, and Indianapolis.1

West Dayton has experienced decades of job losses as a result of the decline of manufacturing in the area. This project will help to reverse that momentum and start bringing some of those jobs back to the community.

## HOME IMPROVEMENT PARTNERSHIPS WEST DAYTON INVESTMENTS

Through the efforts of a range of dedicated partners, West Dayton Neighborhoods have seen close to \$740,000 in investment focused on improving housing stock and supporting neighborhood quality in recent years.

In 2017, Rebuilding Together Dayton made a five-year commitment to focus on West Dayton neighborhoods. So far, they have helped 50 low-income and aging residents improve their homes and eliminated 25,000 pounds of trash through volunteer neighborhood clean ups.

The Montgomery County Land Bank's (MCLB) Thriving Neighborhoods Initiative in the Pineview Neighborhood strives to increase property values, encourage improvements by homeowners, and increase market confidence through blight removal and home rehab. Since it began, MCLB has demolished 12 blighted structures and renovated three homes, each of which was then sold at an incrementally higher price, resulting in market comparables more than 60% above the previous median sales value in the area.

County Corp has partnered with 22 homeowners to make much needed repairs, focusing around dry and safe interventions, such as roofs, windows, and walkways.

# DIGITAL EQUITY PROGRAM WEST DAYTON INVESTMENTS

Montgomery County, Greater Dayton Premier Management, CareSource, Cincinnati Bell Inc., and multiple Dayton-based organizations are partnering to bring highspeed Wi-Fi to more than 1,000 residents living in five housing communities.

In 2020, the Dayton-Montgomery County Digital Equity Initiative project delivered internet connectivity and installation of hardware that is critical for citizens to access jobs, educational opportunities, and healthcare resources. The program also deployed nearly 900 Chromebook devices to residents at five housing communities, three of which are in West Dayton. Through a \$400,000 investment from the Care-Source Foundation, monthly service fees for the project are covered for up to three years, and a diverse group of local stakeholders are currently working on identifying a sustainable funding mechanism for the initiative after that funding is exhausted.

This series of investments is improving quality of life and community connection for hundreds of residents in West Dayton.

## WEST DAYTON BIKE NETWORK WEST DAYTON INVESTMENTS



The Miami Valley is home to the nation's largest paved trail network. The Miami Valley region provides over 350 miles of paved, multi-use recreational trails. Stretching across county lines, these trails connect schools, parks, historic landmarks, and area attractions. Visitors can travel through meadows, scenic countryside, forested areas, and city centers while on the path. This vibrant system of trails enhances both the wellness and quality of life of Miami Valley residents and visitors.

Over the past few years, City of Dayton engineers have prioritized building more cohesive connections between West Dayton and this regional amenity. These efforts not only gives residents access to the recreation trails, but also, through the improved connections to existing infrastructure, encourages increased usage of bikes as a healthier and more sustainable means of transportation. Five Rivers Metro Parks is also committed to extending the bikeway along the Wolf Creek with an additional \$3.9M investment.


